Mercy – The Bread of Life



As we continue our studies in The Beatitudes we come this week to being "merciful". But what does that mean? As an illustration, I share with you a fictional anecdote I once read.

André noticed the man and invited him inside. As they shared some bread and soup, the man revealed he had lost everything in a storm and was searching for work. André listened intently, offering words of comfort and hope.
